Trinity Lutheran Saving Souls in More Ways Than One

The Essex Foundation Grants Funds for AED Purchase

Essex, CT -- Last December Reverend Kurt Saenger-Heyl, Pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church on Main Street in Centerbrook, reached out to The Essex Foundation with a simple yet vital holiday wish. The church needed an onsite, automated external defibrillator (AED) and he hoped the foundation could help fund the purchase and installation of the emergency medical equipment. The Foundation board members responded quickly with unanimous approval to grant funds to cover the entire cost, allowing the equipment to be put in place over the winter months.

An AED is a lightweight, portable device that delivers an electric shock through the chest to the heart to potentially stop an irregular heartbeat and allow a normal rhythm to resume following sudden cardiac arrest. With simple audio and visual commands, AEDs are designed to be simple to use for the layperson as well as people with first-aid, first responder, and CPR training. "The AED provides us with a lifesaving tool to help keep all who come to worship, play music, be fed, do yoga, and many other activities, stay safe and healthy," stated Pastor Kurt, "It enables us to better serve the greater Essex community and all who come through our doors. We are grateful to the Essex Foundation for helping us procure it!"
